

Autumn Term 1


- 'Rainbow Fish' By Pfister, J. Alison James`

Home learning:

Home learning will be given out every '**Friday**' and will be expected to be returned by '**Wednesday**.'

Reading books will also be changed every Friday.

Please ensure home learning and reading records/books are kept in your child's folder.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development Emotional

- Can play in a group, extending and elaborating play ideas, e.g. building up a role-play activity with other children.
- Is more outgoing towards unfamiliar people and more confident in new social situations.
- Begins to accept the needs of others and can take turns and share resources, sometimes with support from others.

Physical Development

- Develop self-help skills
- Managing personal hygiene
- Developing Fine motor skills
- Developing gross motor skills ie: climbing with confidence.

Communication and Language

- Listens to stories with increasing attention and recall.
- Responds to simple instructions,
- Begin to use simple sentences

Literacy

- To encourage the children to distinguish between the marks they make.
- Recognises familiar words and signs such as own name and advertising logos.

Mathematics

- Begin to recite some numbers in sequence.
- Begin to use language for quantities, such as 'more' and 'lot'
- Experiment with symbols and marks to represent number

Understanding of the World

- Beginning to have their own friends
- Have a sense of immediate family
- Notices details in their environment
- Operates mechanical toys

Expressive Arts and Design

- To join in favourite songs
- Show an interest in musical instruments
- Experiment with different blocks and colours
- Beginning to make believe play
